This is a great chance to get an update on the building that will serve as the new home of the Town Hall, Police Department, and the Board of Education. It's a chance to ask questions and get the facts on why the town is considering a new municipal building and why the location has been selected.

- The East Hampton Board of Education was informed that the new student representatives to the Board of Education would be Kristin Whitney and Hannah Balda. They will attend the meeting on Tuesday, September 5.
- There was a public forum to honor Principal John Fidler with a memorial tribute. The following ideas were shared with the Board of Education:
 - Name the T-Bell after Mr. Fidler.
 - Name the Gym after Mr. Fidler.
 - Name the Athletic Field Complex after Mr. Fidler.
 - Start a scholarship in honor of Mr. Fidler. (Please note: A scholarship in John's name has been established already.)Street to School named after John The John Fidler Way or John Fidler Path.
 - Rename North Maple Street after Mr. Fidler.
 - Rename the High School The John Fidler Memorial East Hampton High School
 - Dedicate a Memorial Bench to Mr. Fidler.
 - Have a Bronze Plaque in the building in honor of Mr. Fidler's career.
- The Board of Education will be in communication with the Fidler family prior to the September 5 meeting at which time they will continue the conversation on a memorial tribute.
- Mr. Smith invited the Board of Education to New Teacher Orientation on Thursday, August 24, Convocation on Monday, August 28, and the Ribbon Cutting of East Hampton High School on Friday, September 8.
- The Board received annual information about Middletown Adult Education programs and offerings. The Board pays an annual fee that allows all citizens in town to take GED courses, English Language courses, and Citizenship courses. Other courses are open to the public at nominal fees.
- The Board received information on the Chromebook lease approved by the Town Council. The school will lease 456 Chromebooks that will supplement the devices used for 1-to-1 technology at both the middle school and the high school.
- The Board was given anticipated enrollment figures for the opening of school. These figures will be updated once school begins. (PreK 43, K 141, Gr 1 147, Gr 2 152, Gr 3 132, Gr 4 155, Gr 5 170, Gr 6 158, Gr 7 136, Gr 8 151, Gr 9 125, Gr 10 117, Gr 11 129, Gr 12 108.) Memorial: 615, Center: 325, Middle: 445, High: 479.

East Hampton High School – One Chromebook for Every Student

As a result of the near completion of the High School building renovation and the cooperation of the East Hampton Board
of Finance and Town Council, who have committed capital dollars for technology, the high school is able to enter a lease
agreement that will result in a Chromebook for every student at East Hampton High School. Last year, students in Grades
6-8 at East Hampton Middle School had their own Chromebook during the school day. Students kept their individual
Chromebook in their homeroom and it was signed out in the morning and returned in the afternoon. Our high school

Thoughts

Making Kindness and Caring Common – it needs to be much more than a logo!



In last week's Update, I asked you to join me in an effort to make our schools (and our community) places that promote kindness and caring – not because we don't already, but because we constantly need to ensure that our students experience kindness and caring as youths if we want them to prosper as kind and caring adults.

In this week's Update, I am going to share evidence with you on why kindness and caring is so important. Knowing that this is requires a full school and community approach, I hope every reader will pledge to help! Last spring, East Hampton High School Administration worked with the East Hampton Community Prevention Partnership (James Olsen, Prevention Coordinator) to administer a survey of our students in Grade 9 -12. This survey, **Developmental Assets: A Profile of Your Youth -** *Profiles of Student Life: Attitudes and Behaviors* has been put together by the Search Institute. Through research, they have determined that building up positive assets in students' lives is a much more powerful tool than spending time promoting "prevention" of risky behaviors.

From the Report:

Over the past 20 years, Search Institute has surveyed over three million youth about how they experience the **40 Developmental Assets**—a research-based framework that identifies basic building blocks of human development. We've found clear relationships between youth outcomes and asset levels in both crosssectional and longitudinal studies.

The results are compelling: The more assets kids have, the better. Youth with high asset levels are less likely to engage in high-risk behaviors (such as violence, sexual activity, drug use, and suicide), and more likely to engage in thriving behaviors (such as helping others, doing well in school, and taking on leadership roles).

Assets are crucial for the healthy development of all youth, regardless of their community size, geographic region, gender, economic status, race, or ethnicity. This report summarizes the extent to which your youth experience the Developmental Assets and how the assets relate to their behavior and overall health.

Think of <u>external assets</u> as positive developmental experiences provided for youth by networks of supportive people and social systems in the community. They offer youth a consistent source of love and respect, opportunities for empowerment, leadership, service, and creativity, safe interpersonal and physical boundaries, and high expectations for personal achievement.

The <u>internal assets</u> can be thought of as inner characteristics: a young person's motivation and commitment to academic achievement and lifelong learning; his or her positive personal values; social competencies (including relationship and communication skills); and characteristics of personal identity, including an optimistic future outlook and sense of purpose.

Below are very brief highlights from the 107 page report. The percentages listed to right of the assets are the results of our own East Hampton High School students who are considered to possess particular assets in their life through the manner in which they answered survey questions. To me, there is compelling evidence to promote kindness and caring in our students' lives when one examines these results in an honest manner – because, of course, our goal is to make sure 100% of our students have every one of these assets in their lives. There is no stronger motivation to promote kindness and caring than to look at some of the indicators and realize that in East Hampton as a school community and a community-at large, we can do better for our students. We can – and should - hit 90, 95, or 100%.

Figure 10 shows how alcohol, tobacco, marijuana, and prescription drug use in the 30 days preceding the survey compare across asset levels.

The above chart indicates substance use by East Hampton High School students last spring.

For students who indicate a <u>higher presence of the assets</u> in their lives, risky behavior including use of alcohol, tobacco, marijuana, and prescription drugs is <u>significantly lower</u>.

This is why the East Hampton Public Schools, the East Hampton Community Prevention Partnership, and any community organization will commit to "asset-building" in East Hampton. And, if you look at the assets, it's not a stretch to see how many of those assets are built on kindness and caring.

These are not just school-based assets. These are assets that are promoted at home, churches, community organizations, sports teams, and recreational activities.

Let's *Make Kindness and Caring Common*. It's not the complete answer, but it's a great start as we begin to spread the word on asset-building in East Hampton!
