What is your vision of our graduates?


We are at a very exciting point in education in East Hampton. We have a vision for the District that we call *East Hampton 2025* and we are ready to make that vision a reality by looking at the statements contained within and constructing a process to make them come alive in every one of our classrooms at every grade level.

Our goal is to move the vision from the wall directly to our classrooms and students!

We are calling that effort the **Profile of the East Hampton Graduate 2025.**

We have the data from the school and community that gave us *East Hampton 2025* and our high school has already developed important core values that they are measuring in each classroom as part of the NEASC accreditation process.

Making the vision a reality is our next important leap.



It is our expectation that **the Profile of the East Hampton Graduate 2025** will emphasize a comprehensive view of expectations for students in Pre K through 12, including the transferable skills, content, understandings, and disposition that students should have by the time they graduate. We will also work to make sure that at every grade level there is a clear method of assessing a student's progress toward that vision.

Ken Kay, a leader in educational practice in the U.S. inspires the development of a Profile of the Graduate:

We have experienced an information revolution that has changed the world forever and we now live in a global, knowledge-based economy that emphasizes ideas and innovations. We also face complex political, scientific, health and environmental problems that need to be solved. These societal changes and challenges impact how we define student readiness for the future. To achieve 21st century readiness for every student, developing a shared vision among all key stakeholders regarding the skills that students need to be successful in work, citizenship, and life is critical. A Profile of a Graduate will help you...measure what matters. This includes the real performance-based competencies that students need for success in college, career, life and citizenship.

In addition to identifying the competencies that East Hampton children will be expected to demonstrate and master, the goal is also to create the highest of expectations in a positive **Culture of Learning** as we sculpt the school environment, instruction, and curriculum based on the *learner's perspective*.

In addition, our *learner's perspective* will be viewed through the lens of a **Growth Mindset**, in which the East Hampton Public Schools will stretch its capacity as a high performing learning organization, reinforcing the idea that all students, all classrooms, and all schools have room to grow and continuously improve.



The Vision of the Graduate

According to **Abby Benedetto** from <u>Envision Learning Partners</u>, most schools start with a mission statement and vision statement about why a school exists and what it wants to become; but creating a Vision of the Graduate puts the student as the subject of your sentences. "The Vision of the Graduate is rooted in what our learners will know and be able to do," Benedetto explained.

At the CPS Showcase of Model Schools and Promising Practices earlier this month, Benedetto helped guide participants from member schools through steps to think through their school's Vision of the Graduate. The new CPS 2020 Standards for Accreditation for elementary, middle, and high schools define the Vision of the Graduate as including:



- Knowledge and understanding, or the retaining of information and the ability to use and relate that knowledge to other knowledge and apply it in authentic ways.
- Transferable skills are the essential skills students need to be able to confront new challenges both in and outside of school. Transferable skills include creativity, critical thinking, communication and collaboration, for example.
- Dispositions, which are the patterns of behavior and thinking necessary for success in and out of school. Dispositions include persistence, flexibility, empathy, courage, and accuracy, for example.

Live it in the Classroom

To begin thinking about your school's Vision of the Graduate, Benedetto encourages brainstorming. Start with the words and language you use every day to talk about your students.

"Look through emails, files, texts at what you say to your family and colleagues about your students," Benedetto explained. "Look for the words and phrases you use that best represent your highest hopes for your graduates and what your graduates should be able to do." From this, identify what you want your students to know and be able to do. "Are the skills teachable, learnable, practicable, measureable, and transferable," she added.

Next, visualize the Vision of the Graduate with both form and content. Benedetto emphasizes using an easy to memorize framework that students, educators, and the school community can relate to and remember. Envision Learning Partners offers a Graduate Profile Quality Criteria Checklist to help schools create a Vision of the Graduate that they can build their school system around. It's the core of the instructional model.

"The Vision of the Graduate needs to be living and breathing in the classroom. Students and teachers alike should be able to tell you in similar language what skill they are building on any given day and why it's important," Benedetto said. "It's the thing that links these higher aspirational beliefs with what's happening every day in our classroom to ensure that what the school is focused on is deeper learning.

When schools decide to move toward using a Vision of the Graduate, it also means they have to shift the way they ask students to show what they know. For example, schools might use a capstone project or portfolio defense as an assessment. It helps a school community consider what it wants its students to know and be able to do and whether or not students are able to demonstrate the knowledge and skills you've identified.

"Traditionally, schooling stops at the knowing; we ask students to show what they know on a test and move on" Benedetto said. "But when we ask students to do something with their knowledge, to apply it and make connections to other knowledge, it becomes real. And when we ask students to reflect on and relate to what they learned and how it makes their understanding of the world different, that's when we get to the deeper learning."
