BUDGET UPDATE

Message from the Board of Education

The East Hampton Board of Education requested the lowest increase in the last decade at 1.9%. This is just .1% higher than what residents approved for the schools last year after four referendums.

Superintendent Paul Smith and the BOE believed that a proposal of 1.9% up front was an appropriate and honest request. We believed this was the number that the district could live with for a year, that citizens would support, and that would help the budget pass on the first referendum.

Achieving a 1.9% increase was also a struggle against rising costs. This amount would maintain what we offer today. It was achieved through the reduction of 2.4 teaching positions through attrition, assumptions of 3 more retirements, a low 7.5% increase in health insurance costs, and reductions in other line items that have been lowered year after year.

Every year we manage increases in contractual obligations such as salaries (.97% increase), benefits (.75% increase), transportation (.45% increase), and services for outplaced students (.59% increase), as well as unfunded mandates handed down from the state.

The reduction to 1.7% or approximately \$59,000 approved by the Board of Finance will result in additional cuts, but cutting below 1.7% would be severe, with several teaching positions being cut, some programs eliminated, and further reductions to an already strained budget.

Maintaining a quality education system for our students should be a priority, as it benefits the town and its citizens in many ways.

About the 2016-2017 School Budget

This year's school budget with an increase of 1.9% was developed with three important considerations in mind:

First, it took four votes to pass last year's Town and School Budgets. When it passed, the school budget increase was 1.8%. The School Board understands that a prolonged referendum process is in no one's best interest. That's why the Superintendent's proposed budget is as close to last year's increase as possible.

Second, the attempt was made to adhere as closely as possible to the Town Council Budget Philosophy, which stated, "The Board of Education should maintain current spending levels."

While the Town Council was asking for a 0% budget from the Board, a budget could not be developed that low without doing damage to the schools and programs. The school budget does meet the Town Council's expectation to "maintain or where possible reduce staff" as next year's budget at 1.9% does have a decrease of 2.4 teaching positions.

Third, the budget was developed to balance the needs of our students with the needs of the town. This minimal increase of 0.10% over last year's budget is the smallest possible increase that simply maintains programming as it

currently exists in the schools. No new programming or new technology is proposed in this budget.

Our budgets must match the bold expectations of this community vision for education!


Demonstrated Student Success

Test results and accolades to the school district have proven that dollars are being wisely invested. East Hampton has been recognized numerous times over the last four years as an **Advanced Placement (AP) HONOR ROLL High School** for increasing the number of AP Courses and increasing the number of students taking AP courses. The school has also been recognized as one of "**America's Best High Schools**" by *U.S. News and World Report*.

In a report by *Connecticut Magazine in 2013*, East Hampton High School was ranked 6th in Education out of over 45 towns in the Greater Hartford region. SAT scores for the Class of 2015 continue the trend of well above state and national scores.

The Impact of a 0% Budget



The 1.7% budget approved by the Board of Finance will require additional cuts by the Board of Education. To get to the original 1.9% increase, new technology, supplies, and other items were reduced to the least possible amount. But beginning with 1.9% and going down to 0% requires deep cuts.

Reductions in Teaching Positions:

A minimum of four positions (in addition to the two teaching positions at the Middle School already eliminated to get to 1.9%)

Reductions in Athletics Programs

Eliminate all programs at the Middle School, High School Golf, High School Volleyball, and Concussion Baseline Testing.

Reductions in Central Office Expenditures

Cuts include existing evaluation software, custodial supplies, and building repairs.

Comments have been expressed that in the past the school has said cuts will be made, but they never seem to be made in the end. **Please do not make that assumption with this budget.**

The budget was prepared in January with the absolute figure necessary to move forward one year with the smallest possible increase – especially after four referenda last year.

The final budget for this current school year contained an increase that was reduced to 1.8% as a result of the multiple referenda. To get to 1.9% starting with the lower base from this current year, all accounts have been reduced to their lowest figures and teachers will indeed be cut if the budget is reduced to 0%.
